Abhishek scintillates with 8 sixes; India decimate England in T20I

Kolkata, Jan 23: A scintillating knock by Abhishek Sharma powered India to a commanding seven-wicket victory over England in the first T20I at Eden Gardens here on Wednesday.

Sharma's unbeaten 79 off just 34 balls, laced with eight sixes and five boundaries, stole the show as India chased down the target of 133 with 22 balls to spare.

Opting to bowl first, India set the tone with Varun Chakravarthy's mesmerising spell and a disciplined bowling display that restricted England to a modest 132.

However, it was Sharma's batting masterclass that proved decisive, overshadowing England captain Jos Buttler's valiant 68-run effort earlier in the day.

Chakravarthy continued his stellar form, claiming 3/23 to dismantle England's batting



lineup. His variations left the visitors reeling, with crucial wickets of Harry Brook (17), Liam Livingstone (0), and the dangerous Buttler.

India's chase got off to a steady start, but it was Sharma's authoritative stroke play that turned the contest into a one-sided affair. Partnering with Sanju Samson (26 off 20) and Tilak Varma (19), Sharma ensured India maintained an aggressive tempo, even as England's bowlers struggled to contain him. Earlier, Arshdeep Singh became India's leading wicket-taker in T20Is, scalping two early wickets to set the tone. Axar Patel (2/22) and Hardik Pandya (2/33)

provided crucial support to complete a clinical bowling performance.

The victory gives India a 1-0 lead in the five-match series, with the second T20I slated for Saturday at MA Chidambaram Stadium in Chennai.

Varun Chakravarthy's mesmerising spell and Jos Buttler's valiant knock defined the narrative as India restricted England to a modest 132.

Opting to bowl first, India capitalised on the bowling-friendly conditions, with Chakravarthy leading the charge to dismantle England's batting order.

Chakravarthy, who has been in stellar form since his T20I return, delivered another match-winning performance, claiming three crucial wickets for just 23 runs. His variations and deceptive googlies left England batsmen clueless, as he dismissed Harry

Brook (17) and Liam Livingstone (0) in quick succession before removing the dangerous Buttler in the 16th over.

Chakravarthy's consistency has been remarkable, with 20 wickets in just eight matches since his return, making him India's most reliable spinner in the format.

England captain Buttler fought a lone battle, crafting a commanding 68 off 44 balls. The skipper struck eight boundaries and two sixes, displaying his trademark power and timing. Buttler's innings was the only bright spot for the visitors, as he tried to anchor the innings amidst a steady fall of wickets. His dismissal, attempting a big hit off Chakravarthy, marked the end of England's resistance. Buttler's love affair with Eden Gardens continued, with another fifty added to his impressive record at the venue.

Wijk aan Zee, Jan 23: GMs Praggnanandhaa Rameshbabu and Abdusattorov Nodirbek led the field with 4.0 points after the fifth round of the 87th edition of the Tata Steel Masters Chess 2025, at Dorpshuis De Moriaan, Wijk aan Zee here today. Abdusattorov caught overnight leader Praggnanandhaa who drew with lower rated Dutch Grandmaster Max Warmerdam. Sharing the second spot were World Champion Gukesh Dommaraju and Fedoseev Vladimir at 3.5 points.

Three wins of the day came from Fedoseev, Gukesh and Abdusattorov against Caruana, Keymer and van Foreest respectively.
