Govt to give report to EC today on 9 FIRs against SAD workers

Poll panel ordered probe into cases in Tarn Taran, Moga, Amritsar, Batala

The Punjab Government will submit its report regarding the nine FIRs registered against Shiromani Akali Dal workers tomorrow. The cases were registered when the model code of conduct for the Tarn Taran bypoll was in force.

Initially, the report had to be submitted by Wednesday evening. However, the Election Commission of India (ECI) has now allowed the Director General of Police, Punjab, to submit it by Thursday.

The ECI had directed the police to inquire into all FIRs registered during the period of model code of conduct, not only in Tarn

Day after release of DCC list, dissent brews in state Cong

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A day after the All India Congress Committee (AICC) released the list of 27 new District Congress Committee (DCC) chiefs under the party's Sangthan Srijan Abhiyan, dissent is brewing within the Punjab Congress.

Sources said the leaders were waiting for the Tarn Taran bypoll result before planning their next move. The DCC list has not found favour with various factions in the state unit.

The disgruntled leaders said most of those on the list owed their allegiance to the PPCC chief. A senior leader, privy to the development, said recommendations of the CLP leader Partap Bajwa, ex-CM Charanjit Channi and other senior leaders had been ignored in the selection in some cases.

"What is the purpose of the

recommendations of the independent observers when non-deserving candidates have made it to the DCC list," said a former MLA. PPCC chief Amrinder Raja Warring said he had no role in the selection. It had been prepared on the basis of the feedback from the AICC-appointed observers. He rubbished allegations of his critics.

Claiming that the selection was fair, general secretary in charge, Punjab affairs Bhuphesh Baghel, said the DCC had been appointed on the basis of the recommendations of the independent

observers. The PPCC leaders had no role in it, he said.

At least five Hindus, five OBCs and nine Dalit faces were expected in the DCC list. Instead, 11 Jats, two OBCs and five SCs are among the new faces. "The caste quota was changed to adjust the favourites," said a disgruntled leader. Countering the allegation, a senior leader said the selection was a dynamic process and went into merits of the candidates. Analysing the list, party leaders pointed out that there was over-representation of Jats, with 11 making it to the final list at the cost of the OBCs and Dalits, who had been left inadequately represented. A senior Dalit leader said the caste balance had been badly disturbed. The yardstick of sticking to 55 years of age and having spent at least five years in the party had been breached in some cases.

Ban on heavy machinery near Sutlej banks in Moga

MOGA, NOVEMBER 12

Facing rampant illegal sand mining under the cloak of the "Jihda Khet, Usdi Ret" flood relief scheme, the Moga district administration has enforced a ban on heavy machinery near the Sutlej banks.

Deputy Commissioner Sagar Setia today banned the movement and use of all heavy machinery, including JCBs, Poclain machines, trucks and trolleys, for sand and soil extraction on the Sutlej riverbed and in a 500-m radius around the river embankment in the Dharamkot subdivision.

Bid to stop use of 'Jihda Khet, Usdi Ret' scheme as cover by mining mafia

The DC emphasised that the order was necessary as illegal extraction, often conducted under the garb of the relief scheme, posed a severe risk to the river bundhs and bridges, threatening potential loss of life and property.

The "Jihda Khet, Usdi Ret" scheme was intended to provide immediate relief to the flood-affected farmers by allowing them to lift and sell accumulated sand and silt from their fields without permit until December 31. The relaxation was meant strictly for the rehabilitation of farmlands in 29 notified villages in Moga district. However, the administration soon detected rampant illegal mining, where individuals were exploiting the exemption for commercial gains by extracting sand from the non-affected land and unauthorised commercial sites.

The police have registered multiple cases and booked many individuals caught mining sand illegally from non-notified areas and commercial sites in violation of the scheme's terms, said Gurjinder Singh, XEN, Irrigation, Drainage, Mining & Geology Department. — TNS

Punjab produces around 20 million tonnes of paddy residue annually, with non-basmati varieties accounting for about 16 MT. To contain the crisis of burning, the state has deployed 10,000 personnel, including 5,000 nodal officers, 1,500 cluster coordinators and 1,200 field officials across 11,624 villages.

So far, the PPCB has imposed environmental compensation fines of Rs 97 lakh in 104 cases, recovering over Rs 45 lakh. The police have registered 1,483 FIRs under Section 223 of the BNS for violating stubble-burning orders.

Khalsa Aid India office-bearers put in papers over flood relief

Davinderjeet Singh, head of the Khalsa Aid India, along with three office-bearers, resigned from their positions, accusing its overseas head-quartered management of not properly utilising "das-vandh" (donations) gathered for flood victims.

Other office-bearers who resigned are Gurwinder Singh, Kamalpreet Singh and Param Mohabbat Pal Singh.

Referring to the 2025 Punjab flood relief, he asked the Khalsa Aid and other supporting chapters that appealed for donations to declare the total amount raised globally.

Addressing mediapersons here on Wednesday, he asked the donors to question UK-based founder and CEO Ravi Singh about the details of the investments made during the recent floods in Punjab and claimed that most of the aid remained non-invested till date.

He alleged that Ravi Singh's constant interference in field operations and reluctance to empower the India team had resulted in operational paralysis.

"There is no independent board, no accountability structure, and every major decision is dictated by one person sitting thousands of miles away," he said, adding that despite repeated requests, Ravi Singh did not visit Punjab even once to take stock of the floods in Punjab.

that "no contempt proceedings lie against a judicial officer for acts performed in the course of his/her judicial duties, as such acts are protected under law and are subject to correction only in appeal, revision or other appropriate judicial remedy. The exercise of judicial functions cannot be made the subject matter of contempt jurisdiction."

The ruling came during the hearing of a contempt petition alleging violation of a status quo in a civil suit.

charge of her judicial functions". Her counsel submitted that contempt against a judicial officer, performing judicial functions/duties, was not maintainable. In support, the counsel relied upon the Supreme Court judgments.

The counsel for the petitioners, in turn, submitted that the contempt petition with regard to the judicial officer might be dismissed.

"In view of the facts and the submissions made by the counsel for the petition-

ers as well as the respondent-judicial officer, the present contempt petition qua the judicial officer is not maintainable. The same is accordingly dismissed with costs of Rs 25,000 to be paid by the petitioners to the judicial officer within four weeks from today. It is made clear that if the amount of costs is not deposited within the stipulated time, the same shall be recoverable in accordance with law," Justice Gupta asserted.

Book Phillaur DSP for delay in FIR: Child rights panel

Besides, the Additional Chief Secretary was asked to add Section 21 of the POCSO Act to the case against the suspended SHO. It sought information regarding the action taken within a month.

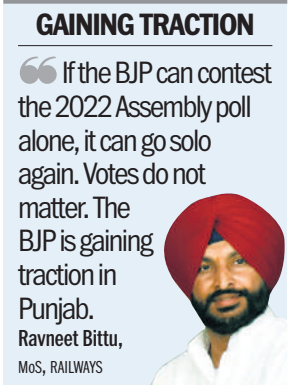

Khalsa Aid India office-bearers put in papers over flood relief

Davinderjeet Singh, head of the Khalsa Aid India, along with three office-bearers, resigned from their positions, accusing its overseas head-quartered management of not properly utilising "das-vandh" (donations) gathered for flood victims.

Other office-bearers who resigned are Gurwinder Singh, Kamalpreet Singh and Param Mohabbat Pal Singh.

Referring to the 2025 Punjab flood relief, he asked the Khalsa Aid and other supporting chapters that appealed for donations to declare the total amount raised globally.

Addressing mediapersons here on Wednesday, he asked the donors to question UK-based founder and CEO Ravi Singh about the details of the investments made during the recent floods in Punjab and claimed that most of the aid remained non-invested till date.

He alleged that Ravi Singh's constant interference in field operations and reluctance to empower the India team had resulted in operational paralysis.

"There is no independent board, no accountability structure, and every major decision is dictated by one person sitting thousands of miles away," he said, adding that despite repeated requests, Ravi Singh did not visit Punjab even once to take stock of the floods in Punjab.

Judges doing duty can't be hauled up for contempt: HC

Reaffirming that judges cannot be hauled up for contempt for performing their judicial functions, the Punjab and Haryana High Court has dismissed with Rs 25,000 costs a contempt petition filed against a judicial officer after terming it legally untenable and contrary to the settled principles protecting judicial independence.

Justice Nidhi Gupta held

that "no contempt proceedings lie against a judicial officer for acts performed in the course of his/her judicial duties, as such acts are protected under law and are subject to correction only in appeal, revision or other appropriate judicial remedy. The exercise of judicial functions cannot be made the subject matter of contempt jurisdiction."

The ruling came during the hearing of a contempt petition alleging violation of a status quo in a civil suit.

Imposes ₹25,000 costs over plea against judicial officer

The matter pertains to the possession of a property in Jalandhar Model Town. During the course of the hearing, the counsel for respondent-judicial officer pointed out that the petitioners were seeking "to proceed with contempt action against her in respect of acts done by her in dis-

charge of her judicial functions". Her counsel submitted that contempt against a judicial officer, performing judicial functions/duties, was not maintainable. In support, the counsel relied upon the Supreme Court judgments.

The counsel for the petitioners, in turn, submitted that the contempt petition with regard to the judicial officer might be dismissed.

"In view of the facts and the submissions made by the counsel for the petition-

ers as well as the respondent-judicial officer, the present contempt petition qua the judicial officer is not maintainable. The same is accordingly dismissed with costs of Rs 25,000 to be paid by the petitioners to the judicial officer within four weeks from today. It is made clear that if the amount of costs is not deposited within the stipulated time, the same shall be recoverable in accordance with law," Justice Gupta asserted.

Book Phillaur DSP for delay in FIR: Child rights panel

The Punjab State Commission for Protection of Child Rights has written to the Additional Chief Secretary, Home Affairs and Justice Department, seeking an FIR against Phillaur DSP Sarwan Singh Bal in connection with a sexual harassment case registered against former SHO Bhushan Kumar.

Apart from a case under the POCSO Act and Section 199 of the BNS, commission chairman Kanwardeep Singh also sought initiation of departmental action against DSP Bal over a delay in the registration of an FIR against the former SHO. Besides, the Additional Chief Secretary was asked to add Section 21 of the POCSO Act to the case against the suspended SHO. It sought information regarding the action taken within a month.

Former minister and ex-Sangrur MLA Vijay Inder Singla said it was a sad state of affairs. He claimed that there was no proper door-to-door waste collection or segregation. Garbage lying at dumping sites also caused diseases, he said.

Residents demanded strict monitoring and imposing penalties on those found burning waste in public places.
