3 Hmar ultras killed in 'encounter'

SILCHAR, July 17: In a major development, three suspected militants who were arrested by police recently for transporting arms, were killed amidst an exchange of fire between a contingent of heavy-armed suspected militants and police at a place close to the Assam-Mizoram interstate border in Cachar district. Sources said the incident took place on Tuesday night. At least three police persons also sustained serious injuries in the incident.

"Based on secret inputs, three suspected militants were arrested from Krishnapur area of Kachudram police station. One AK assault rifle, one single barrel rifle, and one pistol with

ammunition were recovered from their possession," Cachar SP Numal Mahatta said.

Following initial interrogation, while the arrested suspected militants revealed that their colleagues are sheltered on the foothills of Bhuvan Hills with a huge cache of arms intending to carry out "subversive activities" along the Assam-Manipur interstate border area, a police team led by Additional SP (Headquarters) Subrata Sen and AG commandos launched a special operation in the proximity to apprehend the culprits, he said.

"But the police team faced a surprise firing by at least six-seven suspected militants taking shelter behind a huge log. In order to keep the ap-

prehended militants safe, they were given helmets and bullet-proof jackets. But in the fierce gun battle with the suspected militants, the three arrested suspected militants sustained grave injuries following which they were rushed to Sonal PHC," he said.

"Later, when the three were taken to the Silchar Medical College and Hospital, doctors there declared them as dead," Mahatta said.

The Cachar SP further informed that while the attackers managed to flee from the spot taking advantage of the darkness, following a thorough search in the area, one more AK rifle, ammunition and some empty cases were seized.

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Crackdown leads to decline in child marriages in Assam

Report titled 'Towards Justice: Ending Child Marriage' unveiled in Delhi

GUWAHATI, July 17: Legal intervention by the Assam government has reduced child marriages in the State by 81 per cent, stated a report prepared by child rights organisation India Child Protection.

The report, which was released in New Delhi on Wednesday, revealed a whopping 81 per cent reduction in the instances of child marriage across 20 districts of Assam between 2021-22 and 2023-24.

The report titled 'Towards Justice: Ending Child Marriage' was unveiled by the survivors of child marriage in the presence of National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) chairperson Priyanka Kamnagar and filing FIRs in cases related to child marriage can effectively address the occurrence of such cases," the report stated.

India Child Protection is a leading child rights protection organisation dedicated to combatting child sexual abuse and related crimes, including child trafficking, exploitation of children in the digital space, and child marriage.

"Assam has shown that legal action is also the best public awareness message to create the deterrence of child marriage. Ninety eight per cent of the people in Assam today believe that prosecution is the key to ending child marriage," Bhuvan Ribhu said, adding, "This message must go from Assam and spread across India at scale to create a child marriage-free India."

"Two of the key recommendations highlighted in the report are creation of fast-track courts to clear the backlog and secondly, punishment should be doubled and treated as equivalent to criminal conspiracy for rape to the parents, guardians or panchayats who had provided an undertaking.

The report further revealed the urgency required in the legal system across the country to end child marriage. In 2022, out of the total 3,563 child marriage cases listed for trial in courts, a mere 181 cases were successfully concluded, showing a pendency rate of 92 per cent. The report states that the country may take 19 years to clear the backlog of 3,365 cases at the current rate of trial completion.

12 Naxals killed in Maharashtra

GADCHIROLI, July 17: At least 12 Naxalites were killed and two security personnel injured in an encounter with police and commandos in Gadchiroli district of Maharashtra near the Chhattisgarh border on Wednesday, officials said.

The heavy exchange of fire broke out in the afternoon between C60 commandos and Naxals in Wandoli village and continued for six hours, Gadchiroli Superintendent of Police Nilotpal said.

Police have recovered 12 bodies of Naxalites from the spot besides seven automotive weapons, including 3 AK-47s, 2 INSAS rifles, a carbine and an SLR, he said.

One of the slain Naxal was identified as DVCN Laxman Atram alias Vishal Atram, in charge of Tipagad Dalam.

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Centre yet to take steps on NE Water Resources Authority

GUWAHATI, July 17: The much-hyped North East Water Resources Authority for evolving holistic solution to the problem of floods in the region is yet to see the light of day even though a draft Bill for it has already been made ready.

The Government of India formed a high-level committee to study the problem of floods and find ways to deal with them. The committee suggested the constitution of a North East Water Resources Authority.

Sources revealed another committee was entrusted to prepare a draft bill and the process gathered momentum from 2020 to 2023. Initially, the Government of Arunachal Pradesh had some reservations regarding the formation of the Authority but later gave consent to it. The committee also held talks with the Chief Ministers of the North East

states before preparing the draft bill. Official sources revealed that as per the draft bill, the Authority was to be headed by the Union Water Resources Minister and the Chief Ministers of the states of the region were to be the vice chairman on a year rotation period. This decision was taken to ensure full involvement of all the State Governments. The authority was to



be given power even to mobilise international funds to deal with the problem.

However, for the reasons best known to the Government of India, the Bill is yet to be passed in the Parliament to pave the way for the formation of the new body.

Sources pointed out that one state alone cannot solve the problem of floods. The mighty river Brahmaputra flows to Assam through Arunachal Pradesh carrying huge loads of sediments, while, the tributaries of the river also flow through different states of the region. To deal with the issue of sedimentation, which aggravated the problem of floods and erosion, a holistic approach will have to be taken involving all the concerned states. And that is why the decision to form the North East Water Resources Authority was taken. But till date, the Centre has yet to initiate any action on the draft bill for the creation of the new body.

Tea Board advances last date of tea plucking

Second trial in a year to ensure tea quality after cent per cent dust auction

GUWAHATI, July 17: Plucking of tea leaves will have to stop by November 30, the Tea Board said in a directive, in a second experiment within a year after a cent per cent dust auction trial to curb the supply of inferior tea in the market and ensure better price realization.

The move, which many in the industry described as "sensible", will remove the surplus stock of around 50 million kg of poor-quality tea pumped into the market in the lean season that was having a cascading effect on tea prices throughout the year.

According to the Tea Board directive, the last date for plucking leaves will be November 30 and the last date

for processing the leaves is December 2. The schedule had been advanced by a fortnight. Action will be taken against violators under Clause 5 (1) (d) of the Tea (Marketing) Con-



tract Order, 2003. In 2023, the last date of plucking was December 16. This year's order has been given in advance to enable gardens and factories to make plans accordingly.

"During British days, factories used to close down after Diwali because of winter onset. But over the years, manipulative practices began and they used to operate till December-January. Over the last few years, the Tea Board has been issuing directives fixing last dates for plucking leaves. Last few years, the last date was around December 13-17," an industry source said.

As there are no rains during the winter months, the quality of the tea leaves deteriorates. Pruning is carried out during this dormant phase.

Exporters said this end-season tea is of very poor quality and spoiling the Assam tea brand.

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8 of 13 Indian crew onboard capsized vessel rescued

NEW DELHI, July 17: Eight out of 13 Indians onboard a Comoros-flagged cargo vessel that capsized off Oman coast three days ago have been rescued, official sources said on Wednesday.

The vessel 'Falcon Prestige' had capsized on July 14. Thirteen Indian seafarers were onboard the ship.

Nine crew members - eight Indians and one Sri Lankan - have been rescued during the search operations, the sources said.

The search and rescue operations to find the remaining crew members will continue in the area, they said.

The Indian embassy in Oman has been in contact with the authorities concerned in the Gulf nation, the sources said.

The merchant vessel transmitted a distress call around 2200 hours on July 14 off the coast

of Oman, sources said earlier, adding that it has a crew of 16, of which 13 are Indians and three are from Sri Lanka.

"Our embassy in Oman is in constant touch with the Omani authorities. A search and rescue operation for the seafarers, coordinated by the Omani Maritime Security Centre (OMSC), is on," the sources said, adding that "Indian Navy has also joined the search and rescue operations."

The Comoros-flagged merchant vessel capsized 25 nautical miles southeast of Ras Madrakah in the Wilayat of Duqm, OMSC had said in a post on X.

The vessel was headed for the Yemeni port city of Aden after departing from the port of Hamriya, in Dubai.

Duqm Port is a major hub of Oman's major oil and gas mining projects. - PTI
